CHAPTER 1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background

Zomba CCAP is a congregation of the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP) under the Blantyre Synod. It is a metropolitan congregation within the heart of Zomba City, as such congregants come from all over the country and other countries. The congregation was established in 1898. The church building is one of the oldest buildings in the city and has been declared a national monument by the Department of Antiquities. With its humble beginning as a congregation with 14 congregants in 1899, membership has grown to around 2,000, and the congregation has produced over 15 churches.

As a Presbyterian congregation, Zomba CCAP is governed by active, representational leadership of both ministers and church members. The governance of Zomba CCAP is led by a Session comprising Church Elders and Deacons and chaired by the moderator of the church. Decisions of the session are implemented by church management with the leadership of the session clerk. The Zomba City Presbytery, under the Blantyre Synod, supervises the Zomba CCAP Session. Consequently, visions and plans of Zomba CCAP are guided by the constitution, policies and development plans of CCAP, Blantyre Synod.

Currently (in 2022), the church offers several services throughout the days of the week. Sunday worship services are the main activities of the church, with worship services conducted in Chichewa at 6:30 am and 10:30 am and in English at 8:30 am. Sunday school lessons are run parallel to the 8:30 am service. Youth services are conducted every Sunday afternoon from 2:00 pm in the church. The congregation also conducts morning devotions from Monday to Friday between 5:00 am to 5:45 am. Women's Guild conducts their services on Saturdays from 6:30 am to 8:30 am, while Men's Ministry runs their services every fortnight from 8:00 am to 10:00 am. The church also conducts mid-week prayers in each ward known as districts (*milaga*). Standard special programs and activities for the congregation include revival meetings, special teaching sessions, the night of prayers, prayer and fasting, Bible interpretation lessons for church members (Veritas), paper Sundays, and social and spiritual retreats.

The congregation owns the following landed properties: a church building, Mvano Vumbulutso house, a multipurpose hall, an early childhood development centre, a primary school, two manses, three residential houses in Chinamwali, and another smaller house in the manse (Gilgal house). Over the years, several landed properties have been lost because of lack of proper documentation.

1.2 Need for Long-Term Development Plan

While celebrating the ownership of a magnificent building built between 1905 and 1906, and a few properties mentioned above, the congregation has very little to show for its long history. There has been very little infrastructural development. The spiritual programs have also not been guided by a clear vision apart from following the general Christian principles under the presbyterian governance system. Development projects have often been driven by individual interests of the serving Moderators in particular periods. The continuity of some projects has faced challenges when a sitting Moderator has different interests. The interests of Session Clerks, Building Committee, and various ministries have also influenced the congregation to start new projects even when other old or ongoing projects have not been completed.

The haphazard adoption of development projects, lack of documentation, and monitoring that has resulted in limited development of the congregation and loss of property have made the congregation realise the need to develop a well laid up vision and its implementation plans. This led to the development of the first five-year strategic plan launched in January 2020. A long-term vision will therefore provide a long-term direction. Having a long-term vision will ensure that executives do not constantly change the congregation's direction, and the congregation's programming targets the achievement of the long term vision.

1.3 Why 2062?

The year 2062 shall mark 40 years from adopting and implementing this vision. The period of 40 years is well articulated in the Bible as the time it takes for a new generation to arise (Numbers 32:13). The Hebrews lived in the lands outside the promised land for 40 years.

In Christianity, 40 designates significant periods. Before his temptation, Jesus fasted "forty days and forty nights" in the Judean desert (Matthew 4:2, Mark 1:13, Luke 4:2). Similarly, forty days was the period from the resurrection to the ascension of Jesus (Acts 1:3). The sons of Israel ate the manna for forty years until they came to the border of the land of Canaan (Exodus

16:35). God had made them wander in the wilderness for forty years until the entire generation of those who had done evil in the sight of the Lord was destroyed (Numbers 32:13; Deuteronomy 29:5). This vision is a new transformative generation. It describes a 40 years' selfless walk in building a solid growth foundation for the generations to come. It represents the aspirations of youth who are transitioning into future generations.

1.4 Envisioning Process

Zomba CCAP Vision 2062 is for all members of the Zomba CCAP congregation and is owned by them. The development of the vision was coordinated by a task force established by the management of the congregation as mandated by the Zomba CCAP Session. The development of the vision was a consultative process that aimed at obtaining ideas from representatives of all congregation members.

The consultation process started with administering a questionnaire to Christians from all districts (wards), including Zomba CCAP's two prayer houses of Chingamudzi and Zomba Prison. To ensure inclusivity of all members and most importantly, get views from children, an essay writing and art competition was conducted for all Sunday school children. The responses from all these consultations were summarised into themes, and these were used to draft a vision statement, pillars, and enablers of the vision.

The draft vision statement, pillars, and enablers were validated with ministries, committees, and church management representatives.

2.1 The Future We Aspire

The vision of the Zomba CCAP congregation states that "God willing, Zomba CCAP shall by 2062 be a Bible-based Christcentred presbyterian congregation, actively evangelising, discipling, praying and doing charity works, with sound governance systems and stable income sources, and using modern infrastructure and technology while actively safeguarding against secularism or any of its form".

The vision statement reflects on several key elements that are explained below:

Bible-based – Zomba CCAP shall continue to recognise the Bible as the supreme authority for its faith. In this case, policies, programs, activities, and decisions of the congregation shall be guided by the word of God. Where reason and experience contradict the word of God, the congregation shall take the word of God as His will and will follow it. By this, the congregation will continue to be known as "**Doers of the Word**."

Presbyterian – The congregation shall continue to follow PresbyterianismasadescentofScottishCalvinismthatemphasises the sovereignty of God, the authority of the Scriptures, and the necessity of grace through faith in Christ. Zomba CCAP shall fully embrace Presbyterian polity governed by sessions made up of representatives of the congregation (elders); a conciliar approach found at other levels of decision-making (presbytery, synod, and general assembly) as such, Zomba CCAP shall fall under the Blantyre Synod of CCAP and its governance systems and structures. In this case, decision making shall fall under the Session with the leadership of the Moderator. Further, the congregation shall continue to follow the Constitution and other governance tools of CCAP Blantyre Synod.

Obedience to the Great Commission – the congregation shall continue to recognise that evangelism and discipleship are core duties that have been left to us by the Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, the congregation shall seek to make disciples of all nations at all times, starting with Zomba and to other parts of the world(Matthew 28:19; Acts 1:9).

Charity work – The Bible puts the responsibility of taking care of the vulnerable groups – widows, orphans, the sick, the elderly, and the needy in the hands of the church (1 Timothy 5:3-16; Luke 10:30-37). Zomba CCAP shall therefore strive to provide for the needy in obedience to the word of God. Clear plans and programs for the needy shall be developed and implemented.

Sound governance system – The congregation shall strive to put governance systems that shall encourage the congregation's transparency, accountability, and growth. The governance systems shall cover the general administration of the congregation and financial management.

Stable income sources – Most of the aspirations of the Zomba CCAP congregation require adequate financial resources. While "giving" shall continue to be encouraged as one of the acts of faith that will be encouraged, the congregation shall also establish additional income-generating activities to supplement offerings. Some of these supplementary income sources shall include but are not limited to venturing into businesses that also advance

national development and people's welfare, such as education and health.

Modern infrastructure and equipment – To respond to technological advancements, the congregation shall modernise its infrastructure and equipment while maintaining historical structures relevant to the entire nation.

Non-compromising to secularism – The Christian faith has been challenged over the years by different forms of secularism, such as moral decay, gay marriages, and the growth of other religions. Zomba CCAP shall not compromise its faith in God due to these forms of secularism and other emerging forms.

2.2 Sunday School Children's Aspirations

Sunday School Children submitted essays and drawings to reflect on their aspirations in 40 years. The children's aspirations were included in developing the vision, pillars, and enablers. This section reproduces some of the statements that the children produced.

- A big modern church with many Christians.
- A church with more Christians who are spiritually independent and mature, who have accepted Jesus as their Lord and saviour.
- Visiting the sick in hospitals, giving food and clothes to those in need, teach love for one another, convert people from other religions to Christianity, children to respect elders, preach about the importance of sharing the gospel.
- Church surrounded by beautiful flowers, new slides, and new swings, taps, and good toilets plus large Sunday School Building.
- Sunday school children shouldn't lead services on designated Sunday school days only
- Buy a bus for Sunday school for trips to other churches/places
- Zomba CCAP will have skills development training centre: photography/recording, carpentry, electrician, tinsmith, etc
- Set apart days to visit needy people, the sick, and people with disability
- Farming livestock such as pigs, cattle, goats, and chickens (layers), or crops such as cotton, maize, and peanuts

CHAPTER 3 PILLARS OF THE DEVELOPMENT VISION

3.1 Introduction

The Zomba CCAP 2062 Vision rests on four pillars: spiritual growth, social inclusiveness, financial sustainability, and infrastructure development. These pillars shall form building blocks working together. The pillars are explained in detail below:

3.2 Pillar 1: Spiritual Growth

"And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." Acts 2:47

As was the case with the first church, Zomba CCAP Congregation aspires to be a spiritually growing congregation in the next forty years. Spiritual growth shall be promoted at all levels, including individual members, families, ministries, *milagas* and the congregation. Zomba CCAP shall grow in numbers, and its members shall develop to be more mature Christians. Members of the congregation shall increase in numbers through evangelising non-believers and nurturing children born to members. The children shall join through Sunday School.

Spiritual maturity entails becoming true disciples of our Lord Jesus Christ by bearing the fruit of the spirit (Galatians 5:22-23) while obeying his call for the great commission (Matthew 28: 16-20). Critical activities in promoting the congregation's spiritual growth shall promote sound teachings, bible studies, and prayer life.

3.2.1 Teachings

For spiritual growth to manifest, first and foremost, the person must know the word of God. This can only be achieved by reading the word of God for knowledge and understanding of His absolute messages that communicate to His people what He has decreed so that they live according to His word. To be spiritual is to live according to God's standards. God's word teaches, rebukes, and corrects us so that we live according to Christ-like qualities (2 Timothy 3:16; Colossians 3:16). The word of God also teaches us His promises, and when we recognise that God can do what He says, our faith in the Lord increases. The congregation's programs shall teach its members the accurate word of God. The teachings shall be through church services and special teaching sessions such as retreats and holy weeks.

3.2.2 **Prayer**

Prayer is essential for Christians to grow in their faith. The Apostle Paul exhorts us to pray without ceasing (1 Thessalonians 5:17), not be anxious about anything, but make our requests known to God (Philippians 4:6). Prayer keeps us away from sin and temptation (James 4:7; Matthew 26:41). Subsequently, the congregation shall aim to build the prayer lives of its members. Zomba CCAP shall organise various prayer programs like prayer and fasting and night of prayers. Zomba CCAP shall also continue with morning devotions to build the congregation's prayer life.

To encourage the prayer life of its members, the church shall set one of the rooms as a prayer/intercession room. This will be a room that can be accessed at any time by members who want to have individual prayer time, thereby making the church the house of prayer of its members at all times (Isaiah 56:7).

3.2.3 Bible studies

As a Bible-based congregation, we shall strive to strengthen our

knowledge of the word of God through Bible studies. Bible study groups will be established within the *milagas*, and a common bible study guide shall be used.

3.3 Pillar 2: Inclusiveness and Empowerment

"there were no needy persons among them. For from time to time those who owned land or houses sold them, brought the money from the sales" Acts 4: 34

"that they may be one as we are" John 17:22

Members of Zomba CCAP have God-given talents that are diverse. These talents include spiritual gifts, orientation to worship, income levels, education backgrounds, professions, and demographics. We shall use these talents for making the congregation strong and self-sufficient and not as a means of social stratification. The congregation shall use the different God-given talents for the church's growth. All individuals in the church shall be given equal opportunities to use their talents to support each other. More importantly, Zomba CCAP shall strive to provide equal access to opportunities and resources for people who might otherwise be excluded or marginalised, such as those having physical or mental disabilities or belonging to other minority groups. Worship services shall accommodate diverse groups without compromising the Christian faith. Below are some of the programmes that will be established to make the church respond to the needs of the surrounding society.

3.3.1 Outreach activities

The church has widows, orphans, the elderly and other vulnerable individuals who need material or financial support.

The church shall establish a fund for supporting these groups. The fund shall be financed by the annual budget and wellwishers/special offerings. Zomba CCAP shall also develop feeding programs for the needy as a tool of evangelism.

Zomba CCAP has relatively more opportunities and incomes than rural congregations as a city congregation. To fulfil its vision, Zomba CCAP shall support congregations in the rural areas with material and financial support. The support will also target ministers residing in rural areas and operations of the congregations in rural areas, such as church building projects. The congregation shall adopt a congregation at the beginning of the year to assist management in implementing these activities.

3.3.2 Social and economic empowerment programmes

To increase the ability of members to interact with society meaningfully, the church shall start offering social and economic empowerment programmes. These will be vocational training for the youth, entrepreneurship workshops for all, and workshops on biblical perspectives of corruption, politics, gender, and other topics.

3.4 Pillar 3: Infrastructure Development

"I have indeed built a **magnificent** temple for you, a place for you to dwell forever" 1 Kings 8:13

Infrastructure development is essential to facilitate worship and generation of income. As the congregation is growing and the times are changing, the need for developing new infrastructure arises. As such, the church shall develop infrastructure that shall accommodate the congregation's emerging needs, including Information and communication technologies (ICT). The infrastructure shall be designed to address both the aspiration for spiritual growth, the aspirations for social inclusiveness, and financial sustainability. All infrastructure that will be developed will address the other three pillars. The type and design of the infrastructure shall live to the taste of time as Solomon did. While emphasising modern infrastructure, the congregation shall also maintain the current infrastructure because of its historical relevance. Below are some of the building blocks for this pillar.

3.4.1 Maintain old church building

The present church building was built in 1905, and it is now considered a national monument in Malawi that needs to be preserved. Under such circumstances, the building cannot be expanded or modified to meet the increasing demand of the church. With time, some preservative measures must be put in place to ensure the stability of such a historical building, such as banning vehicle movements around the church and reducing or limiting vibrations from musical equipment and dancing. There will always be a need for undertaking maintenance from time to time. The church must engage experts on maintaining the building as works of unprofessional artisans can damage it.

3.4.2 Construct a new church

To meet the increasing population of the church, there is a need to put a new church complex preferably with more than one floor to accommodate more members. The construction of the new church is proposed in the space parallel to the current church, and construction is planned to start after the various revenue generation projects have been put in place. The new church shall be designed to accommodate multiple interests and facilitate the use of modern technology in preaching, singing and bible readings. This is to ensure that adequate resources are available for such a project.

3.4.3 Construct a business complex and residential houses

The church will consider putting up a multi-business complex within its premises to increase its revenue base. Consideration will be placed on a multi-floor structure that will contain shops and offices. The church will use the *Built Own Transfer (BOT)* approach to finance this construction by creating a church-based company with 50% of the shares owned by the church itself and the other 50% by the church members. Once completed and rented out, the church shall continue to buy the shares from the members for an agreed period, for example,15 years, after which the church will have 100 per cent ownership. The same approach will be used to construct dwelling houses in Chinamwali and on land close to the primary school.

3.4.4 **Construct secondary school and clinic/hospitals**

Zomba CCAP shall use education and health services as tools of evangelism. The church as a mission centre needs to be at the forefront of assisting the Government in providing social services like education and health. The church has a primary school that the Government of Malawi runs, and the plan is to build a private secondary school to benefit some of our children while raising revenue for the church. A private clinic/hospital will be considered in similar circumstances.

3.4.5 **Transportation services**

The church has transport needs that can be resolved by procuring vehicles. The mobility needs include local such as moderator's visits to districts and the office requirements. Other mobility needs refer to long trips by different groups such as choirs, the youth, Sunday school, and funerals. The church shall buy a bus that shall be used for trips, and it shall also be used for income generation. The church shall also procure utility vehicles.

3.4.6 Securing church land and property

The church has a lot of landed properties but has also lost landed properties over time. The church shall secure all its landed property and procure more property in the future.

3.5 Pillar 4: Sustainable Financing

"Ants are creatures of little strength, yet they store up their food in the summer;" Proverbs 30:25

Zomba CCAP recognises that none of its aspirations can be attained without financial resources. The church does not only aspire to have adequate financial resources but the resources that are managed well, with well-established financial systems. Zomba CCAP shall invest in not-for-profit businesses to ensure a continuous flow of income. This shall be supported by a transparent financial management system that builds the congregation's confidence in managing the resources.

Some of the building blocks for this pillar are presented below:

2.5.1 Promote teachings on giving

The Bible teaches the church to give to make sure that there is food in the house of the Lord. The projects that have been implemented in the Bible used resources provided by members. Zomba CCAP shall teach its members all offering types in building the financial base. After being taught, members will be encouraged to give towards the work of God.

3.5.2 Diversify revenue sources

The church shall endeavour to diversify sources of income by employing various innovative means to ensure that it does not only rely on Sunday offerings as a significant source of revenue. The church shall start several businesses. The initial financing shall still come from the offerings. The church shall use Bible-based teachings to train or teach the members to give generously. Potential businesses include constructing private schools, hospitals, and houses for rent. The church shall also consider investing in other financial instruments such as bonds and shares. The Church shall also introduce an electronic plate for Sunday offerings to allow members to use the various money transfer systems to give to the church.

3.5.3 Prudent financial management

As the church intends to improve its sources of revenue through several business initiatives, it will be prudent to improve financial management. When the church starts dealing in real estate by renting out shops and houses, it will be imperative to establish a solid and vibrant Finance Department managed by qualified experts. Such a step will respond to several concerns mentioned as a deterrent for giving money to the church.

CHAPTER 4 ENABLERS OF THE DEVELOPMENT VISION

The following enablers shall anchor the Pillars:

4.1 Fellowship

The early Christians met daily, communed together, and shared their possessions (Acts 2:42-47). All these acts enable believers' faith to grow. Through this fellowship, believers are evangelising others – nonbelievers and those that have weakened in their faithcome to Christ to fulfil the great commission (Matthew 28:16-20). Fellowship provides opportunities to preach the gospel and lead people to God. Fellowship shall be encouraged by strengthening worship at the community level (mulaga), strengthening other ministries like women's guild (*mvano*), men's ministry, and youth ministry. The congregation shall support *mvano* programs to recruit more members to this ministry. The congregation shall also continue to support the men's ministry. Youth ministry shall be strengthened by continuing to recognise youth services as one of the primary services of the congregation. The congregation shall also continue to monitor the activities of the youth ministry to make sure that the youth does not fall into strange teachings, and the youth shall be involved in all church programs.

The congregation shall allocate financial resources to women's guild, men ministry, and youth ministry in the annual budget to strengthen fellowship.

4.2 Church Governance

The leadership of Zomba CCAP shall, by contrast, embrace transformation, coping with change that is not only caring

and supportive, but development conscious of embracing the vision and its implementation strategies without prejudice at all levels. Strong leadership at all levels has become so important because the business world has become more competitive and more volatile in recent years. More change always demands more leadership. However, "Trust" in leadership shall be the foundation of all good leadership. We shall trust the leadership that brings people together for the common good, synergise the group, find common ground, and develop and empower people for a greater reality.

4.3 Technology

Zomba CCAP shall digitise its services and operations in all contexts. The digitalisation of processes shall improve on timely communication with all its members. In this regard, we shall develop a radio station linked to social media platforms such as the equivalents of YouTube and short videos to invite church events. Digitalisation shall also help in transparency and accountability that will help provide real-time reports. We shall rebrand the church website to match with other business-oriented websites.

The church website shall be managed by dedicated technicians to continuously update it and provide the various services and activities live online. The church shall also introduce a digital offering plate that can facilitate offering for those who have not come to church.

Since music is an integral part of worship, the church shall continue to acquire and use modern music equipment, including establishing a recording studio for music groups and others at a fee.

4.4 Partnership

Zomba CCAP shall build strategic partnerships to empower and serve each other to enrich shared vision. As followers of Jesus, not only have we been saved into a new life, but we've been placed into a larger family. And this larger family brings with it benefits that going at it alone never could. We shall have partnerships that get the opportunity to learn models of ministry which have been tested and developed by friends at the national, south-south, and south-north cooperation. However, we shall prioritise partnerships with local rural churches that share our common belief regardless of the name because we desire to equip the Church to fulfil its role as salt and light in the world and that local churches are catalysts for community change.

4.5 Missions and Evangelism

Zomba CCAP shall commit to missions and evangelism. We shall commit 10 per cent of the annual budget to missions and evangelism because these will be key to achieving our vision. We shall develop missionaries to unleash an army of disciples on an unsuspecting world. We shall create a loving and caring Christian community affecting a global impact for Christ through its local, regional, and international outreach.

To increase the ability of members to interact with society meaningfully, the church shall start offering social and economic empowerment programmes. These will be vocational training for the youth, entrepreneurship workshops for all, and workshops on biblical perspectives of corruption, politics, gender, climate change, and other topics.

4.6 Strong Families

We shall strengthen families to create a safe, stable, and loving environment where a husband and wife can support and enhance each other and where children can learn, grow, and develop. We believe there is nothing more important than solid united families, so important that family is at the centre of gospel learning. Children learn to love others, show compassion, build trust, and express loyalty in the home. A family influences its members' happiness and wellbeing, impacts the society around it and continues to have significance even after death. We shall endeavour to build successful marriages and families established and maintained on principles of faith, prayer, repentance, forgiveness, respect, love, compassion, work, and wholesome recreational activities. These will include holding family seminars, integrating social activities such as sports or hiking, apart from bible studies, encouraging husband and wife to go to church together and sit together in church. Other activities that will be implemented to strengthen families include singles seminars, couples' seminars, and couples retreats and outings.

We believe that we will build a committed church from committed families. Zomba CCAP shall implement several activities to build Christian family lives.

4.7 Strong Sunday School and Youth Participation

Strengthening Sunday school will assist in building a base for adding members through baptism and confirmations. Sunday school will lay the foundation for Christianity and discipleship. It also creates opportunities for children to develop leadership skills. The congregation shall strengthen Sunday school by investing in teacher training, materials, and infrastructure that includes playgroup equipment and materials. There shall also be Sunday school transition programs to help newly baptised and confirmed members become established Christians. Our catechumen class members shall attend church services every Sunday. Further, the congregation shall reinstate the Sunday School time within the primary services to encourage children and enable parents to monitor what is being taught.

Youth participation in the congregation's activities has been considered one of the ways of keeping young people in the congregation. The congregation shall make deliberate efforts to have young people participate in the church's programs. The congregation shall also hold youth evangelism programs such as sports evangelism to bring more young people to the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The church shall recognise the youth service as one of the main services. In doing so, the church shall not organise programs in the church to replace youth services the same way the church does not easily push around the morning services.

Further, church programs and activities shall be developed to interest young people. Programs shall make the youth feel loved and appreciated by the church. The church shall embrace media (social and main) to encourage youth participation.

CHAPTER 5 IMPLEMENTATION ARRANGEMENT, MONITORING AND EVALUATION

5.1 Governance Structure

Zomba CCAP is structured into departments/sectors called ministries based on the demographic characteristics of the members and activities they implement. Ministries defined based on demographic traits include Sunday School, Youth, Women's Guild, and Men's Ministry. Ministries defined based on activities they implement include evangelism, education, music, finance, building and development, fundraising, relief, environment and climate change, faith and works, holy communion, and audit. The Session supervises all the ministries through the church management.

5.2 Implementation Arrangement

The Zomba CCAP Vision 2062 belongs to all members of the Zomba CCAP congregation, and all shall implement it. These include communicant Christians, Catechumen Class Pupils, Hearers Class Pupils and Sunday School Pupils. Session of the Zomba CCAP shall have oversight in the implementation while Zomba CCAP Management shall coordinate this. Oversight responsibilities of the Session shall involve approving programs and projects and monitoring the performance of the programs and projects. Zomba CCAP Session shall ensure that projects contribute to the congregation's overall vision when approving the programs and projects. The session shall also ensure that the congregation is not implementing more than one big project at a time.

The coordination role of church management will involve supervising individuals, committees, and ministries. Church management shall make sure that all implementing arms of the congregation are implementing the activities as approved by the session. Church management will use the monitoring and evaluation committee to assess the implementation of the activities.

It should further be noted that this long term vision shall be implemented through five-year plans. The five-year plans will outline the interventions for each of the pillars and enablers of the vision prioritised to be implemented within the five years.

5.3 Introduce Vision Sunday

This vision will be implemented for 40 years which is a long time. To make sure that all members are aware of the vision throughout the implementation of the vision, Zomba CCAP must find a way of continuously reminding the members about the vision. It is recommended that the congregation introduce a vision Sunday held at least once a year. On this Sunday, preaching, teachings, and all worship activities shall evolve around the vision.

5.4 **Preparatory Activities**

To successfully implement this plan, the congregation needs to implement some preparatory activities that will enable the congregation to implement the plan. These activities include rationalising committees, securing land, developing a master plan, and strengthening the monitoring and evaluation committee.

5.4.1 **Development of policies and guidelines**

Zomba CCAP shall continue to use all the policies that have been adopted by CCAP, Blantyre Synod. There are, however, development aspirations in this document that require congregation level policies to be developed. The need to develop policies was first stated in the first strategic plan for Zomba CCAP. Policies will enhance governance and management systems.

5.4.2 Rationalisation of church committees

A 2012 Report by the Research Committee of the Congregation recommended that committees be restructured with some of the committees merged to improve their performance. This was first stated in the 2019-2023 Strategic Plan, where it was recommended that the number of committees is reduced from 20 to 10. Implementing the long-term vision requires highly effective committees, and the church may need to take this route to enable committees to assist in achieving this vision. The congregation may consider making some committees sub-committees of higher committees that will be answerable to the session.

Further, Zomba CCAP should consider changing the procedures for electing members to church committees by moving away from the voluntary membership approach to the church management appointing members. Few committees that represent the church's sub-section, such as *milagas, women's ministry, men's ministry, and youth,* should elect their committees.

5.4.3 Securing Land and Developing Masterplan

The church's pieces of land at Zomba zero come as different plots. These plots do not have title deeds, and planning becomes difficult. The church should immediately invest

money in surveying its land and combine the small plots to have one land plot with a single title deed. The church should also invest money in engaging experts who can develop a master plan for the congregation. The master plan will show the placements of all planned infrastructure. This will assist in having coordinated developments in the future.

5.4.4 Strengthening the Monitoring and Evaluation Team

Based on the recommendation of the 2019-2023 strategic plan, a Monitoring and Evaluation Team has been established, and this has not been active. The church should thus find means of making this team active.

5.5 Monitoring and Evaluation

Progress towards attaining the vision will be implemented through five-year implementation plans. At the end of each 5-year implementation cycle, the progress report will also assess cumulative progress made. Monitoring and evaluation of the plans will be coordinated by the Monitoring and Evaluation team, which will perform its duties on behalf of church management. **Monitoring and Evaluation Framework**
